#### What's in Wood Smoke?

- "Ah, the sweet smell of wood smoke" but what makes it so sweet?
- CO, NOx, HC, VOCs, and Particle Pollution
- Toxics, including:
  - Benzene
  - Toluene
  - Aldehyde gases
  - Polycyclic organic matter
  - Methane and black carbon




# Why Do We Care About Residential Wood Smoke?

- Fine particle pollution (PM2.5)
  - ~6% (315,000 tons) of total PM2.5 direct emissions
  - ~ Five times more than all of these combined:
    - US petroleum refineries
    - Cement manufacturers
    - Pulp and paper plants











# Why is Wood Smoke a Health Concern?

#### Wood Smoke: Hazardous Air Pollutants

Nationally, residential wood combustion accounts for about:

- 20 percent of total stationary and mobile polycyclic organic matter (POM) emissions
- 50% of the area source cancer risks
- 8% of the overall noncancer (respiratory) risk




